Minutes

1. CALL TO ORDER

The City Council of the City of Laurinburg held its regular meeting on Tuesday, February 20, 2024, in the Council Chambers of the City Hall and Police Department at 6:00 p.m. with the Honorable James T. Willis, Mayor, presiding. The following Councilmembers were present: Mary Jo Adams, Mary Evans, Rosemary Rainer, Barbara Rogers, and Andrew G. Williamson, Jr.

Also present were Charles D. Nichols III, City Manager; William P. Floyd, Jr., City Attorney; Harold W. Haywood, Administrative Services Director / City Clerk; Amanda Futrell, Administrative Support Assistant/Deputy City Clerk.

Mayor Willis called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Councilmember Barbara Rogers gave the Invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

2. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Councilmember Adams moved to approve the agenda, with a second by Councilmember Rainer and the vote was unanimous.

3. RECOGNITION

Mayor Willis honored former Police Chief Robert Malloy.

a. Resolution No. R-2024-01 Honoring Former Police Chief Robert Malloy

Mayor Willis honored former Police Chief Robert Malloy, by reading aloud the wording on Resolution No. R-2024-01 presented to Chief Malloy's family as follows:

In Memory of Former Police Chief Robert Malloy

WHEREAS, Police Chief Robert Lee Malloy was born on January 30, 1948;
and

WHEREAS, Chief Malloy joined the Laurinburg Police Department on
September 6, 1969; and

WHEREAS, on April 25, 1989, Chief Malloy was appointed as the first African
American Chief of Police for the City of Laurinburg; and

WHEREAS, Chief Malloy, after almost 20 years as Chief of Police for the City
of Laurinburg and 37 years in law enforcement retired from the City of
Laurinburg Police Department; and

WHEREAS, after his retirement, Chief Malloy continued to serve his
community; and

WHEREAS, Chief Robert Lee Malloy, passed away on February 1, 2024, after
a lifetime of love and dedication for his community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Laurinburg City Council that
all honor and appreciation is bestowed upon the memory of Former Police
Chief Robert Lee Malloy. He is a testament to service to his community and
may his memory live long in all of the citizens of the City of Laurinburg; and

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED by the Laurinburg City Council that in honor of
Police Chief Robert Malloy for his life-long contributions to the citizens of
Laurinburg, that February 1st be proclaimed as "Police Chief Robert Lee
Malloy Day."

4. PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Mrs. Loretta McNeil of South King Street came before the Council tonight on behalf of Juneteenth Day. She stated Juneteenth is a national holiday and that she wanted to ask the Council to consider Juneteenth a paid holiday in Laurinburg, NC for city employees.

Mrs. Linda Douglas of Allen Lane in Laurinburg, NC. She stated that she wanted to come before the Council about a safety concern and how it was addressed. She stated that the community has many vacant houses and some of them attract unsavory people looking for shelter. She stated that this results in safety issues for homeowners around these vacant properties. She stated the vacant home beside her was set on fire by someone and the Laurinburg Fire Department had to contain the fire. Mrs. Douglas stated she felt this was a safety issue and tried to find out who she should contact to voice her concerns. She thanked Councilmember Rainer for reaching out to Mr. Mac McInnis about the property. She voiced her concerns about being told that Mr. McInnis was unable to locate the property owner, Kim Carmichael, and was later told that Mrs. Carmichael was finally located, but her husband is currently having health issues. She stated that her safety concerns should still be addressed. She stated that she spoke to the City Manager and was advised that he spoke with Mr. McInnis and was advised of the same information.

Mayor Willis asked if there was anyone else that wanted to speak in front of the Council tonight. There weren't any additional parties that wanted to speak before the Council.

5. CONSENT AGENDA

Mayor Willis Read aloud the Consent Agenda:

- a. Consider the draft Minutes of the January 16, 2024, regular meeting.
- b. Consider road closure for the Habitat for Humanity's "Run with the Knights 24 Hour Ultra" Event to be held on March 23, 2024, at 8:00 a.m. through March 24, 2024, at 8:00 a.m.
- c. Consider road closure for the Festival of Arts event to be held on March 16, 2024, from 12:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

- d. Consider the approval of the use of McDuffie Square from Scotland Memorial Foundation for the 2024 Fund Run and the Health & Wellness Fair on Saturday, April 20, 2024, from 6:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Councilmember Evans moved to approve the Consent Agenda.

Councilmember Adams moved to second the motion, and the vote was as follows:

6. PUBLIC HEARING

Mayor Willis opened the public hearing to consider a Request to Rezone 308 Everett Street from Office/Institutional to General Business.

Mayor Willis asked Mr. Mac McInnis to come up and give the Council the details of the rezoning request. Mr. McInnis stated tonight's public hearing is for a request to rezone 308 Everett Street from Office/Institutional to General Business. He stated there has been some concern expressed among homeowners on Everett Street about allowing General Business use in the area. Mr. McInnis stated that the planning board heard the request from Mr. Dallas Everett to rezone the parcel on January 17, 2024, and voted 5 to 1 to not recommend the rezoning. A conversation ensued about why the rezoning was not recommended. Mr. McInnis said that the reason that the rezoning was not recommended by the planning board was due to the possible intrusive uses that the rezoning would open up in the neighborhood. He stated that the Council had been supplied with a list of possible businesses that would be allowed if the parcel was rezoned to General Business.

Public Comments in Favor of the Rezoning

Mrs. Shirley Campbell of Isabelle Street, Laurinburg, NC spoke in favor of the rezoning of 308 Everett Street. She stated that she thought it would be a great thing for Mr. Everett to open a gym for the kids. She stated that kids are currently going to the Fayetteville and Southern Pines areas to do the things that Mr. Everett wants to bring to Laurinburg. She stated she feels it would be fun for the City, and it would bring in income.

The City Attorney stated that he wanted to advise the Council that the purpose of the hearing is to consider a zoning request and it is not a special use permit request. He stated that the Council is not deciding on the particular use and the information that the Council is hearing about the use of the parcel is not relevant to the decision to whether the parcel is proper to be rezoned for General

Business. A conversation ensued about whether a special use permit would be required later. The City Attorney advised that if the rezoning request were granted, a special use permit would not be required for this particular use. A conversation ensued about the area that would be changed by the rezoning. The City Attorney advised that it would only change that particular parcel.

Mrs. Loretta McNeil of South King Street, Laurinburg, NC spoke in favor of the rezoning of 308 Everett Street. She stated that Scotland Youth Development has been working with Mr. Everett for years to bring positive projects to the City. She stated that the rezoning would bring positive business here and help us to work with young people and their guardians.

Mr. Dallas Everett of Cronley Street, Laurinburg, NC spoke in favor of the rezoning of 308 Everett Street. Mr. Everett stated that 308 Everett Street is a vacant lot that he purchased with the intent to expand his 211 W Cronley Street property. He stated that the building he has now is a fitness center which was once on Atkinson Street. He stated it did well at that location, but he was unable to expand on Atkinson Street. He stated that when the Laurinburg Exchange building came open, he decided to purchase it, or that he was in the process of purchasing it [he doesn't currently own it]. He stated he wanted to give the City of Laurinburg the opportunity to grow like other cities. Mr. Everett stated that you should not have to travel all the way to Fayetteville to get on a bounce house. He stated that he has 8 bounce houses right now and arcade games in storage that he can't use because he doesn't have the space. Mr. Everett stated that they had boxing classes, step classes and birthday parties there without any complaints. Mr. Everett stated he is trying to bring something to the City for both the kids and the adults. He stated that his facility is open to the entire community. Mr. Everett stated that he plans to put internet in the facility so that the kids can come in and do their homework. He stated that he intends to put a pool in as well, which can be used for water aerobics. He stated he plans to have laser tag, a restaurant and karaoke. He stated that he will not change what his plans are for the parcel. Mr. Everett asked the Council if they had any questions for him.

Councilmember Adams stated that she knows Mr. Everett does good things for the community. She stated that she was going over the planning board meeting information. She stated that she noticed that there were some concerns about parking in addition to the other uses that could go on this property. Councilmember Adams asked Mr. Everett how he responded to the parking issue that was addressed at the planning board meeting. Mr. Everett stated that cars could park on Everett Street and Atkinson Street because it is public parking. He stated that the facility would be an enclosed building. Councilmember Adams stated that she is concerned about what could be put on the parcel if it was not in Mr. Everett's possession. Mr. Everett stated that if someone came in and put an unwanted

facility on the parcel, it would be the City Council's job to pass an ordinance or rezone the parcel to remove the facility. Councilmember Adams asked Mr. Everett

if he knew how the parcel was zoned prior to purchasing the parcel. Mr. Everett stated that he did, and he knew he would need to get it rezoned.

Mayor Willis asked if there was anyone else that wanted to speak in favor of the rezoning. There wasn't anyone else that wanted to speak in favor of the rezoning.

Public Comments in Opposition of the Rezoning

Mr. Thomas Willis of Everett Street, Laurinburg, NC spoke in opposition to the rezoning of 308 Everett Street from Office/Industrial to General Business. Mr. Willis stated that he is concerned about parking. He stated that his neighbors across the street and beside him do not have driveways and must park on the street. He stated that some of the parking spaces that Mr. Everett is talking about are privately owned by individuals that let the City use the spaces for events such as the Laurinburg After Five. He stated that during the prior zoning meeting, Mr. Everett discussed hours of 11:00 p.m. Mr. Willis stated that he did not want people walking the neighborhood and slamming car doors at 11:00 p.m. He stated that there are plenty of places in Laurinburg where this type of facility would be a good idea, but he does not think it is a good idea in a residential neighborhood.

Mayor Willis asked if there was anyone else that wanted to speak in opposition to the rezoning. There wasn't anyone else that wanted to speak in opposition to the rezoning.

Mayor Willis reminded the Council that there was a letter attached from another neighbor in the neighborhood that could not be at the meeting tonight.

Mayor Willis closed the public hearing. He stated that it is now the purview of the Council to act on this request.

Councilmember Mary Evans made a motion to approve Ordinance No. O2024-07 rezoning from Office/Institutional to General Business the property located at 308 Everett Street and identified as Scotland County Parcel Number 01000107010. Councilmember Rainer second the motion and the vote was as follows:

7. CITY MANAGER REPORTS

- a. Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Audit Results Presentation - Carl Head - Roche, Head & Associates, PLLC

The City Manager stated that Mr. Carl Head is here giving a presentation about the results of the fiscal year 2022-2023 audit.

Mr. Carl Head stated that the Council should have a one-page report in front of them. He stated that Roche, Head & Associates only provides a reasonable level of assurance and not an absolute level of assurance that the City of Laurinburg's financial statements are free from material misstatement. He explained that a reasonable level of assurance would be a 7 out of 10, with a 10 being an absolute level of assurance. He stated that their opinion is unmodified and that it is a good opinion. He stated that they believe that the financial statements are free from material misstatement. Mr. Head then reviewed the following:

He explained that the Cash Balances in each fund in 2023 were as follows:

General Fund:	\$4,082,798
Electric Fund:	\$1,955,508
Water Fund:	\$880,020
Solid Waste Fund:	\$793,885

Mr. Head addressed the statement of cash flows. He stated the statement of cash flows are one of the more important of the balance sheet. He stated the cash flows tell you if you are charging enough for current operations in the water, sewer, and solid waste fund. He stated that the electric fund, water fund and solid waste fund were all positive numbers, which is a good sign. He explained the statement of cash flows (operating cash increases) in 2023 was

as follows:

Electric:	\$841,156
Water:	\$841,016
Solid Waste:	\$335,707

Mr. Head stated that there are a few issues that he must address. He stated that about 3 years ago, the Local Government Commission came up with a spreadsheet that auditors would put these numbers into. He stated that the spreadsheet does calculations and comes back with color coding on the figures. He stated that the figures that come up in red are considered performance indicators that must be addressed. Mr. Head stated that the City of Laurinburg's water fund and electric fund came back as performance indicators. He stated that the cash is too low in those funds. He stated that the City of Laurinburg has a lot of projects, especially water projects, that require cash outflow which depletes cash. Mr. Head stated that the City of Laurinburg has about 1 month of cash in the water fund and electric fund. Mr. Head stated that the Local Government Commission sees that as the minimum and states that there should be more than 1 month of cash in the funds. He stated the general fund is healthy and has 4-5 months' worth of cash. He stated the LGC requires a written response from the City of Laurinburg with a plan on how it will increase the funds. He stated that the City is already addressing water and electric fees, which will also help. Mr. Head also addressed a few more performance indicators such as journal entries, inventory counts and the audit taking place after November of 2023.

Mayor Willis stated that the letter to the LGC is already completed, and he has it tonight, for the Council to sign.

Councilmember Williamson addressed the state having more stringent requirements now than in prior years. A conversation ensued about the new LGC standards. The City Manager stated that there was a water increase that took place July 1, 2023, which would have been in the new budget. He stated that this should increase the cash flow in the water fund. He also stated that the Council is set to start talking about the electric rate study as well. The City Manager also addressed capital projects that have taken place, such as the second substation, that would have affected the cash flow of the funds.

- b. Consider Financial Performance Indicators of Concern (FPIC) Required Responses to the Local Government Commission for the Fiscal Year 2023 Audit

The City Manager commended the finance department for their excellent work with the audit. He stated that this item is for the Council to consider the response letter that is being passed around to be signed that will be sent to the Local Government Commission.

Councilmember Adams motioned to approve the required responses to the Local Government Commission to address the Financial Performance Indicators of Concern related to the Fiscal Year 2023 Audit. Councilmember Evans moved to second, and the vote was unanimous.

c. Update on Legacy Mural Project / McDuffie Square Plaque

The Community Development Director, Mr. Walker McCoy, advised the Council that he is here to give an update on the Legacy Mural Projects. He stated that the Council should have renderings of the murals and the wording for the McDuffie Square Plaque in their agenda documents. Mr. McCoy showed the Council a display of the "Laurinburg, Deeply Rooted" mural that would be painted on the old Firestone building, and he advised that the artist would be easy to work with if the Council had any additional ideas or changes. A conversation ensued about possible changes or additions to the mural. Mr. McCoy showed the Council a display of the mural that would be placed on the wall at McDuffie Square. The mural consisted of photos of Mr. Emmanuel McDuffie, the Laurinburg Institute, and prominent people from the Laurinburg Institute, including Charles Scott, Sam Jones, and Dizzy Gillespie. A conversation ensued about trying to get the mural and plaque approved, so it could be started prior to many festivals that will be taking place in Laurinburg.

d. Consider Releases, Discoveries, and Adjustments to Tax Levy

The City Manager stated that this item is for the Council to consider releases, discoveries, and adjustments to tax levy. He stated that the tax collector for the City of Laurinburg, Mrs. Diana Chavis, is here to present those.

Mrs. Diana Chavis stated that she is reporting adjustments and discoveries for 2023. She stated that the adjustments were \$16,464.97 and the discoveries were \$87,924.

Councilmember Rainer moved to approve the adjustments to the tax levy, with a second by Councilmember Adams, and the vote was unanimous.

e. Authorize Tax Collector to Advertise Tax Liens the Week of March 11-15, 2024

Mrs. Diana Chavis stated that this item is to set an advertisement date for tax liens the week of March 11-15, 2024. She stated that the unpaid taxes right now are \$215,804.98.

Councilmember Williamson asked how the unpaid tax balance is compared to the previous year. Mrs. Diana Chavis stated that the amount is way down compared to the previous year.

Councilmember Adams motioned to authorize the Tax Collector to advertise tax liens the week of March 11-15, 2024. Councilmember Evans moved to second the motion, and the vote was unanimous.

- f. Consider Ordinance No. O-2024-02 Amending the FY 2023-2024 Budget Appropriations Ordinance (Ordinance No. O-2023-08) for the Fire Department

The City Manager stated that this item is a budget amendment that came from Council approving updating the personnel certification policy and allowing all the fire department to get the technical rescue certification. He stated that the certification is a 5-month program, and the members of the fire department will have completed it in May. He stated that a budget amendment is needed because the members of the fire department that will receive the certification will get a 2.5% pay increase once it is completed. He stated that this ordinance is to cover the pay increase the staff will receive at the completion of the certification.

Councilmember Adams moved to approve Ordinance No. O-2024-02 amending the FY 2023-2024 Budget Appropriations Ordinance (Ordinance No. O-2023-08) in the General Fund by increasing revenues by \$18,784 from Fund Balance Appropriation (line item 10-439900) and increasing expenditures by \$18,784 for Fire Dept. Salaries (line item 530-500200). Councilmember Williamson moved to second the motion, and the vote was as follows:

- g. Consider Ordinance No. O-2024-03 Amending the FY 2023-2024 Budget Appropriations Ordinance (Ordinance No. O-2023-08) to transfer funds from the Annual Capital Projects Fund to the operating funds to pay for capital projects.

The City Manager said that this item is to amend the FY 2023-2024 Appropriations Ordinance to transfer funds from the Annual Capital Project Fund to the operating funds to pay for capital projects. He stated that this deals with the City's firetruck and a stump grinder. He stated that the ordinance would allow the funds to be moved from the Annual Capital Project Fund to the general fund for the firetruck and the funds for the stump grinder to be put in the electric fund.

Councilmember Evans moved to approve Ordinance No. O-2024-03 amending the FY 2023-2024 Budget Appropriations Ordinance (Ordinance No. O-2023-08) in the by increasing revenues in line item 30-439711 by \$25,060 and line item 10439711 by \$313,012; and increase expenditures in line item 832-707400 by \$25,060 and line item 530-703400 by \$313,012. Councilmember Williamson moved to second the motion, and the vote was as follows:

- h. Consider Resolution No. R-2024-02 to Accept Drinking Water/Wastewater State Reserve Grant Offers

The City Manager stated that the next 4 items all deal with the \$20 million state appropriation that was awarded to the City of Laurinburg. He stated that this resolution will allow the City of Laurinburg to accept the funds received with the water/wastewater state reserve grant. He stated that it details the three projects that the funds will be used for, including \$2.4 million for the McColl water line replacements, \$7.2 million for the raw water system expansion and \$9.7 million for the wastewater treatment plant renovations.

Councilmember Rainer moved to approve Resolution No. R-2024-02 to accept drinking water/wastewater state reserve grant offers. Councilmember Williamson moved to second the motion, and the vote was as follows:

The City Manager stated that this item is to amend the Water/Sewer Capital Projects Ordinance for the Leith Creek Wastewater Treatment Plant Renovations - Phase II Project.

Councilmember Evans moved to approve Ordinance No. O-2024-05 amending the Water/Sewer Capital Project Ordinance to allocate revenues and expenditures for the Leith Creek Wastewater Treatment Plant

Renovations - Phase II Project. Councilmember Rainer moved to second the motion, and the vote was as follows:

The City Manager stated that he wanted to extend the invitation sent by Commissioner Gibson to the Council to visit Sycamore Lane Elementary School on February 28, 2024, at 8:30 am. Sycamore Lane Elementary School is requesting that elected officials discuss their role for the elementary school students. He asked the Council and the Mayor to let the administration department know if any of them would be able to attend.

8. APPOINTMENTS

a. Mayoral Appointment to the Laurinburg Housing Authority Board

Mayor Willis stated that Mr. William Tyson has graciously agreed to accept the position on the Laurinburg Housing Authority Board that was left vacant by the passing of former Police Chief Robert Malloy. He asked the City Clerk to arrange for Mr. Tyson to be administered his oath of office. Mayor Willis thanked Mr. Tyson for agreeing to serve.

9. COMMENTS FROM MAYOR AND/OR COUNCILMEMBERS

Councilmember Rogers stated that since the dilapidated building has come up numerous times, she wanted to see if there had been any grants located that may assist. She stated that the Council had discussed a similar municipality that had received funding for dilapidated buildings. The City Manager advised the Council that Mr. David Richardson had reached out for information about that assistance. He stated that he would reach back out to Mr. Richardson. A conversation ensued about the possibility of providing literature that residents would have access to discussing the process and resources available to help with removing a dilapidated property.

Councilmember Adams stated that she attended the League of Municipalities' essentials program for re-elected and newly elected officials, and it was a well spent two days.

Councilmember Evans stated that the City of Laurinburg staff, including the fire department and police department, stood tall when honoring the legacy of former Police Chief Robert Malloy. She said that they needed to be appreciated for doing all that they did.

Councilmember Rogers stated that she is on the African American Heritage Committee that hosts the Kumba Festival. She stated that it was another successful year and thanked everyone that attended.

10. CLOSED SESSION (Personnel)

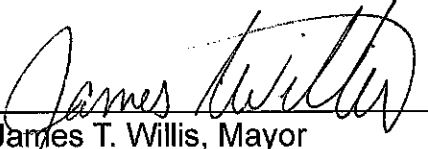

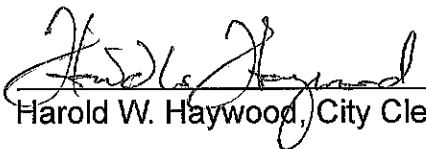
